FROM YOUR PASTOR'S DESK

In the 1980's Mary Brenner was a divorced mother of seven children who owned a carbon paper manufacturing company in Beverly Hills. She was a friend of all the movie stars, went to their parties, and hobnobbed with celebrities. What turned her around, and made her see life differently? She came across a very touching photograph of the Holocaust. Among the people in the photograph there was a young boy facing a Nazi soldier who was pointing a rifle at him. The child's eyes showed deep fear and bewilderment. Mary Brenner looked at that photograph and suddenly realized that life could never be the same for her. She felt an enormous compassion for all those who were victims of brutality, for those who were the most marginalized. She went to the bishop of San Diego and said, "I'd like to belong to some kind of a religious order and dedicate myself to those people nobody else seems to care for." She would up being called Sister Antonio, and working with the women in the Tijuana Prison, a women's prison in Mexico. These inmates of the prison were among the most abject, forlorn, and neglected segment of humanity. Sister Antonio became their friend, companion, sister, and mother all in one. That holocaust picture was Mary Brenner's *burning bush*.

Today's first reading speaks of a similar conversion that happened to Moses. We know that tragic events occur randomly as in the case of the Galileans and the eighteen Jerusalemites and have nothing to do with the guilt or innocence of the victims. For example, a tornado that destroys a nightclub also destroys a church. An earthquake or tsunami kills the saints as well as the sinners in the affected area. Drunk drivers kill innocent people. Religious fanatics, terrorists and suicide bombers cause the untimely death of good as well as bad people. Violent people, with or without provocation, injure their loved ones. Only a few of us will have a *burning-bush* experience, but all of us have struggled to understand why tragedy seems to befall innocent people. What we need is to trust in divine mercy, believing that God is with us and God is on our side even in those situations we cannot explain. Jesus' life is the clearest evidence that a person's suffering is not proof of that person's sin. While sin can lead to tragedy, every tragedy is not the result of sin.

Today's gospel explains how God disciplines His people, invites them to repent of their sins, to renew their lives and to produce the fruits of the Holy Spirit. Citing two tragic events, Jesus exhorts the Jews to repent and reform their lives. With the parable of the barren fig tree, he also warns them that the merciful God will not put up with them indefinitely. Although God patiently waits for sinners to repent, giving them grace to do so, He will not wait forever. Time may run out; therefore timely repentance is necessary. Hence a Lent missed is a year lost from the spiritual life.

Personal note: Thanks for all the prayers. We had a safe journey to Holy Land and back. I could feel the power of your prayers. Sometime this month, I hope to share with you all some highlights of the trip.

A Note from Father Hendricks regarding Latin Mass

Archbishop Ranjith, when Secretary of the Congregation which oversees the English Mass rubrics gave some speeches a few years ago in which he said that the pope wanted the Latin Mass in all parishes on Sundays. Recently a group in Poland submitted some questions to the Commission Ecclesia Dei (which watches over the Latin Mass). The Commission answered five questions submitted in German with Italian responses, from which we can conclude the mind of the pope. No translation into English has been published yet; only summaries of the questions and responses. Another question pertains to the times of services where parishes have Sunday morning filled with the Ordinary rite Masses, leaving inconvenient times for the Latin Mass. The response stated that the pastor could replace one of the Vatican II Masses with a Latin Mass (on his own authority). The rights of the Faithful to the Latin Mass come into play at this situation. We will look at another response next week.

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Haiti Contributions Deductible on 2009 Return

Congress has passed a bill (HR 4462) to permit taxpayers contributing to Haitian relief charities to elect to treat contributions made after Jan. 11, 2010, and before Mar. 1, 2010, as if the contributions had been made on Dec. 31, 2009. If the election is made, Haiti relief donations would be deductible on the 2009 return, not the 2010 return.

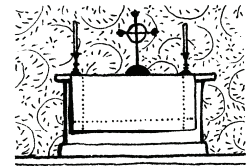

SAINT FRANCES OF ROME (1384-1440) March 9

Nature and human nature—plagues and wars—turned late medieval Rome into a living hell, particularly for the sick and poor. Frances, by birth and marriage well provided for, was a devoted wife and mother; but like Benedictine Oblates who, to this day, “pray and work” while living with their families and working in the world, she joined like-minded laywomen friends in ministering to society’s most vulnerable. Frances’ charity was not only “hands on” but “in home.” Her palace becoming a hospital after the plague claimed two of her three children. When her husband’s death ended their loving marriage of forty years, Frances joined other widowed Oblates in community. In an interesting link to the United States, our nation’s premier religious congregation for women of color, the Oblate Sisters of Providence, in 1833 established bonds of spiritual communion with these “Oblates of Saint Frances” in Rome. Though Black History Month is past, take a moment to learn about the good work that Mother Lange’s spiritual daughters are doing still and consider supporting them as a Lenten project: www.oblatesisters.com.

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FRUITFUL OR PRODUCTIVE?

“Yes,” said Joel, “I’m hooked on productivity. I run a business, and we have young children. My days are packed.” Joel’s thinking was challenged at a men’s retreat. The leader asked, “Do you think Jesus had a daily to-do list? (‘Three people healed today. Two fast comebacks to the scribes and Pharisees. One really great parable told and dinner for 5,000. Well done, me’).” Joel listened intently. “Jesus spoke wisely with mercy and grace. He occasionally retreated from crowds, yet when he was with people, he was really with them and loved them well. But was he productive? Productivity can become a mind-set of being busy as a lifestyle. Productivity seeks what fruitfulness claims as its starting point—the assurance of God’s presence and love.” Fruitfulness, Joel saw, allows you to be fully present in the moment. Fruitfulness is rooted in God’s grace, requiring trust in the Holy Spirit, like compost around the fig tree in today’s Gospel. The Spirit works at all times and places and, if we allow it, is at work in us—busy or not.

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
