FROM YOUR PASTOR'S DESK

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German Lutheran theologian, wrote a series of reflections on the Sermon on the Mount entitled *The Cost of Discipleship*, in which he maintained that discipleship requires us to make a fundamental decision to follow Jesus and to accept the consequences of that decision. His own religious convictions led him to stand up to the tyranny of Nazi Germany and to participate in a plot to assassinate Adolph Hitler. The plot was uncovered, Bonhoeffer was apprehended, and the ultimate "cost" of discipleship was exacted of him. He was hanged by the Nazis on April 9, 1945. While discipleship might force some people to decide between life and death, few of us will be asked to pay that ultimate price. But today's gospel challenges us to live in a certain way imitating the prophetic vocation of Jesus.

Today's gospel passage deals with the beginning of Jesus' journey from the northern towns of Galilee to the southern city of Jerusalem through the land of Samaria. Jesus encountered obstacles both from prospective disciples who wanted to postpone their commitment until a more convenient time, and from the Samaritans.

As in the case of Elisha and the apostles, our commitment becomes our life. But today, more than ever, people make commitments too easily and then break them. This is the age of the lack of true commitment. The problem today is not that people are living together without being married; the problem is that they do not have the courage to *make* the commitment of marriage. In recent years, the age of marriage has increased by more than three years in the West—more than 10%. Modern people find many excuses for delaying marriage: "Well, let's get good jobs and financial security first." Another familiar excuse is: "I want to be free to come and go as I please!" Another excuse for delaying marriage is: "Let's live together first. We'll see if we're compatible!" But the fact is that the longer unmarried couples live together, the more they experience their incompatibility! There is enough statistical evidence to substantiate this observation.

We all know there is a tremendous shortage of priests and religious men because our young people are unwilling to make commitments to God by committing themselves to life-long celibacy, to a diocese or to the vowed life of a religious community. The argument, "I don't want to make that commitment because I don't want to give everything away," shows an incorrect notion of Christian freedom. We begin to be free only when we start the process called commitment, and our freedom is realized only when we give ourselves away in love.

MIXED MESSAGE

Words are funny things. Over long periods of time they can take on new meanings, sometimes the opposite of what they originally meant. So it is with the word diversity, which originally meant opposite, different. Reactions to our human differences range all the way from suspicion to outright violence. As our world has shrunk through global travel and migration, we have tried to develop ways of making difference, or diversity, seem like a positive thing. One Catholic parish, with significant numbers of new parishioners speaking Spanish and Vietnamese, tried to tackle this in a new mission statement, including some lofty language about diversity. "The concept of diversity includes acceptance and respect . . . appreciating each other and moving beyond simple tolerance to embracing and celebrating the rich dimensions of diversity in a safe, positive, and nurturing environment." At a meeting where, once again, complicated arrangements were underway for each language group to have separate liturgies, one person commented that the new mission statement did not reflect any new reality in the parish. "The parish is still separated in worship, in faith formation, and even in community involvement and giving" he said. Some Anglo parishioners remarked angrily to the pastor that "those people" (other language speakers) do not give "their fair share" (meaning money). Saint Paul, according to today's reading, would characterize this as "biting and devouring one another" (Galatians 5:15). He reminds us that the greatest commandment is to love our neighbor as ourselves. What a challenge that is when we sometimes find it difficult to get along even with family and close friends. But, as Christ's disciples, everyone who comes to our parish is by definition a brother or sister in Christ. Everyone. No exceptions.

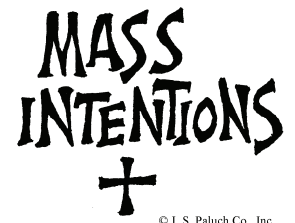

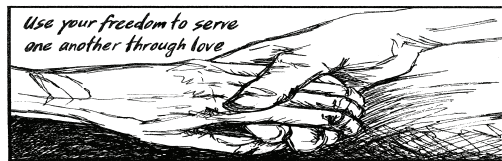



St. Catherine Parish Council Meeting - June 8, 2010

The meeting was opened with a prayer by Albert Domm. The May meeting minutes were approved on a motion by Cindy Dugger, seconded by Anthony Thomas.

Old Business

The identification of the parish resources for the planning phase of the rebuilding program as identified by the Planning Committee is still in progress. The establishment of a timeline with goals and priorities is contingent upon the findings of that group therefore has not been correlated as of yet.

Jennifer Hultgren presented the suggested additions, omissions and revisions of the parish bylaw document that is in the process of being formulated as provided by the council as requested. These were discussed in detail and the resulting recommendations will be incorporated into a draft that will be submitted to Fr. Davis and the council. Before final approval the completed document will be sent to the Dioceses for review.

Clare Keller gave a report on the findings for the proposed parish picnic. A decision was made to stage the function on the church grounds thereby eliminating the rental expense of the 4H Camp. Lynn Reed, Joe Grossheim and Clare Keller will recruit a committee to plan activities for all age groups and work out the necessary logistics. More details on the event will follow.

New Business

Ann Domm announced plans for a new parish directory. The particulars are being worked out of which the parishioners will soon be advised.

Deacon Keller informed the council of the implementation of the new Emergency Action Plan. Copies will be available in the office should anyone want to read all details. An announcement will be placed in the bulletin with information for general informational purposes. He also submitted data on a new interfaith project "People Helping People" for parish consideration. This endeavor already has 5 participating churches and relates to the activity which St. Catherine has attempted to undertake.

Clare Keller requested that the council be provided with a monthly financial report thereby enabling them to make more informed and astute decision regarding financial matters.

Fr. Davis spoke about the death of his brother and his intent to attend the special event planned for 40 days after his brother's death – a custom celebrated in India.

The meeting was closed with a prayer.
