Father Hendricks' Corner

Before we continue with the narrative, there was one other comment about the seminary in Ohio. The spiritual director gave a one hour class each week on spiritual direction and the stress for the beginning students was that feelings had no place in religion. Religion is a matter of intellect and will. Again in philosophy, we were trained in saying "I think that the matter concerns...(e.g. the final cause), not "I feel that the matter..." The last year we were warned through the first semester whenever an "I feel" came out. The rule for the last semester was that for each instance of "I feel" you said in class discussion, you lost a letter grade from the semester average. That semester there was very guarded speech and no slip-ups. I have been very attuned to "I feel"s ever since.

Someone read a preview copy of last week's bulletin and asked about "church history" vs "history of the church" and "theology" vs "religion". "History of the Church" as I use it is a narration of discrete events that happened by or to the church, and usually starts with "why should I study this subject?" The methodology is usually secular. "Church history" is a study of the psyche of Holy Mother Church as expressed in space and time through actions done by and to her. The "why" pertains to the church or the "Mystical Body of Christ" (why did the church do this) and not the student's "why study" but the student finds himself through class comparing and conforming his psyche to that of the church, not consciously, but implicit in the study of "church history." The "history of the church" (study of discrete events) provides the data for "church history". Once the "I" and "why" are linked the study becomes egocentric. The aim is to keep the study church-centric. The mindsets are as different as geocentric and heliocentric astronomies although the data (planet's positions or historical events) are identical. If I had students daily as sophomores whom I didn't have as freshmen, it took about a week or more to reorient them which was done through class presentation.

Religion, from re-ligare, to bind again, binds the person once more to God restoring the break of original sin. That is the study appropriate in the parish and early schools. Theology is the intellectual study of God and is a part of "religion" which applies theology to life. In the seminary system I was formed, theology was studied after the person had a degree in philosophy. Some people use the terms interchangeably, but the implications come through in a patterned study over a period of time.

I headed off to Rome. American students lived at the North American College (NAC) and studied at the Gregorian University (GU). At the NAC we resided, had classes in matters that pertained to the U.S., and did all the paper work to stay legal in Italy. Ordinations were about half-way through the fourth year, with six students ordained the previous July. To place the time line Edward Kmiec was ordained my second year and Wyatt Funk arrived in October after I left in July. One important factor for our consideration was a class in social justice taught by a substitute for Msgr Ryan from the NCWC that year. There was a student whose family were Al Smith democrats and he would pick the priest's presentation defending the New Deal to pieces. The priest was recalled back to Washington about a third of the way through the course. Some students' fathers were chairmen of various state Democrat Party organizations. Al Smith was a Catholic Democrat politician, critical of the New Deal, following the teaching of the church with about half the Democrat party ↗

following him. When Ronald Reagan said the Democrat party left him, as his thought is very similar, I conclude that he was an Al Smith democrat and today the closest to an Al Smith democrat is a Reagan republican. The student applied the principle of subsidiarity to the various instances in the classes. That principle was only explained and defended in the moral theology classes.

The Gregorian University had a four year theology course at that time, which if you met the requirements [an exercise to prove competency to function in the area of the study (English allowed), passed a multi hour written exam on Sacred Scripture (Latin), and a four member one hour oral exam on anything taught the four years (Latin)], you ended up with a License (considered a degree in the U.S.). One course greatly affecting this topic was a semester of canon law, half was church-state relations, and the other half was on the religious life. Given a choice of two questions on a written exam all NAC students took "Explain the steps to be observed from the time a woman rings the doorbell at the convent and a valid and licit solemn religious profession." There were either 72 or 78 provisions to be observed in the old law which took the whole two hours to write. This course of study was important because ownership pertains to the thing, its use and the "usufructus" use of the fruits. The God-given right is only limited by natural law, e.g., I can't throw the apples from my tree through the neighbor's window, but I can plant the seeds, make apple pie or cider, sell them, feed them to my pigs and eat bacon, etc. It is the role of the state to protect this right of ownership. If the state through socialist policies takes these rights (for example, restricts what crop can be planted as tobacco or wheat), the vow of poverty means nothing if the person doesn't have the right to own and use property in the first place to vow away. Inherent in the priesthood is a detachment from worldly things modeled after the ideal of the vow of poverty. For deacons and priests this comes from the ordination rather than the vow. As the religious life and bishops are considered in the State of Perfection by St Thomas; deacons and priests are working toward the ideal. We find continual condemnations of socialism such as Pius XI Quad Anno that no sincere Catholic can be a socialist. If the government takes away the rights little by little as history shows usually happens, everyone becomes a "religious" without vows to God, which then don't mean anything. The citizens then lose everything, which the religious vow to God, to the state, making government their god. This has been the trend in the United States since the 1930s with 54% of the American Catholics voting in support of socialist policies in the last election. The vows and the religious life, and consequently the priesthood, get distorted or meaningless. This forms the ironic truth underlying the aphorisms; religious take the vow of poverty and secular priests live it; and the laity get the type of priests they deserve. At the Gregorian I learned the implications of ethics in relation to the church and state. There was also a major stress on dogma.

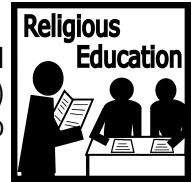

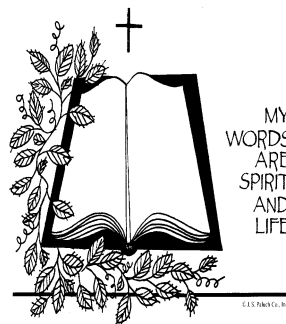

In the ancient world, "household" was a wide-reaching concept. 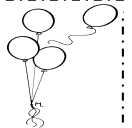
TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This is the height of vacation season, but as anyone who has ever been to Rome in the summer knows, no time to visit there! The city is sweltering, and in a pre-air-conditioned world long ago, Romans figured out that they needed a break in the surrounding hills. Even the pope clears out. His destination is usually Castelgandolfo, a lovely little hill town southeast of Rome, overlooking a tranquil lake. It has been a papal possession since about 1600, and in 1929, when most of the papal states were finally lost, the papal dwelling was given "extraterritorial rights," meaning that it is an extension of Vatican City and not under Italian rule. The Vatican observatory maintained telescopes here for decades, far from the glare of the city lights of Rome, but although the observatory offices remain here year round, the telescopes are in Arizona. Pope Benedict spends less time here than his predecessors, favoring his homeland or the Italian Alps. Clearly, he believes that there is a spiritual side to vacations. A few years ago, he remarked that vacations provide amusement and diversion, and also the chance to be renewed physically and spiritually.

Vacations can help us visit friends and relatives, and revive "those human contacts that the pace of our lives keeps us from cultivating." The pope needs a break, and so do you. Vacation comes from a word meaning to empty oneself. There's still time to clear the calendar for at least one golden summer day even if you don't have a personal castle in the hills!
