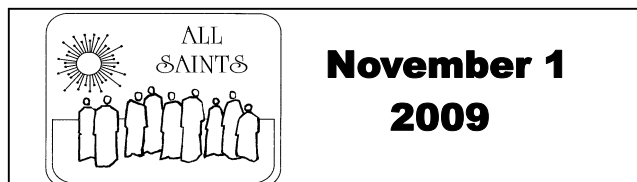

FROM YOUR PASTOR'S DESK

During the second half of the twentieth century, countless Christians in Eastern Europe suffered injustice, persecution, torture, and even martyrdom under Soviet communism, which tried to eliminate religion from culture. One of the many heroic bishops who continued to preach the Gospel under these conditions tells the story about how he first discovered his vocation. He was orphaned at a young age and lived with his grandmother. She was the housekeeper for his uncle, a parish priest. Soon after the communists took power, they arrested this priest, leaving the grandmother and the young boy to fend for themselves. About a week after the arrest, soldiers came to the rectory to search for documents and other incriminating evidence. While they searched, they confiscated every religious image they could find. When they finally finished, the grandmother and her grandson (the future bishop) were standing outside the front door as the last soldiers were leaving. One of the soldiers laughed and sarcastically said to the woman, "Well, do you have any more religious pictures or crosses that we can take with us?" The woman smiled at the young communist and said, "Actually yes, I do have one more, but you can't take it away from me." And then, still looking him in the eye, she made the sign of the cross. The soldier's face went white and he left without another word. The serenity and strength of that woman, that saint, in the midst of such injustice and hardship, inspired her grandson to make Jesus Christ his closest friend, and to dedicate his life to serving the Church.

What does it mean to be a saint? Saintliness means conveying the love of God to people. A saint is one who is goodness incarnate; righteousness in the flesh. The saint is altruistic, always living for others, always doing for others. Many stereotypes of saints have been unfair and untrue. Far from being other-worldly, saints have been the most down-to-earth people I have known. This is the point: They know how to make Christ's Gospel relative to ordinary situations in daily living.

Saints are imperfect and that is good. Often saints are put on a pedestal and thought of as people who never do anything wrong.

To be a saint is not to be perfect – not to be made of plastic, with hands folded, and eyes rolled up, sort of living under glass so that no dust gets on us – but to be whole, which is a word related to heal, healthy, and holy.

Too often people believe that holiness means perfection and flawlessness. There are parts of ourselves that are imperfect, that are flawed, that are wounded, that are out of sorts, that are out of balance, that are dark and seamy, and that are not yet conscious. That's what makes a person holy—to go and turn around and embrace the part of ourselves that is imperfect.

To be a saint is the most difficult, yet the most simple thing in the world, because it means, "Being fully human, awake, alive, conscious, humble, close to the ground." St. Jerome struggled with a terrible temper all of his life... St. Therese of Lisieux often fell asleep when she prayed... St. Alphonsus had frequent bouts of scruples. St. Vincent de Paul was very irascible. St. Jerome had a vitriolic pen. When we read and study the lives of the saints, we come to see that for most of them, it was in very

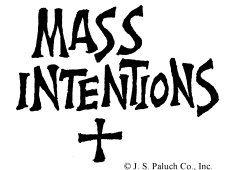

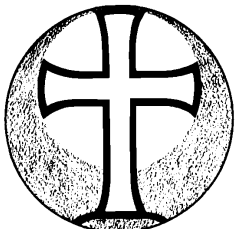

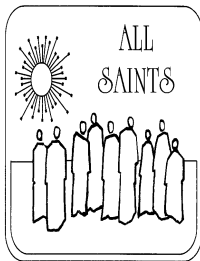

WE LONG TO SEE GOD'S FACE

"Lord, this is the people that longs to see your face." This antiphon for today's responsorial psalm offers the focus for today's readings. As we on earth celebrate the triumph of all the saints—the ones officially canonized by the Church, and the countless others who have also reached heaven—we add nothing to their glory. But we give ourselves reason to hope. We, too, long to see the face of God and believe that we can one day be counted among those whose robes, as John tells us in the book of Revelation, are washed "white in the blood of the Lamb."

The passage from John's first letter offers further assurance: we are God's children who will one day see God. But today's Gospel pulls us past longing and reassurance into action. Jesus clearly tells us what we must do to be counted among the saints. We must be poor in spirit, hungry for holiness, merciful, single-hearted, and peacemakers! Then we, too, will see the face of God.

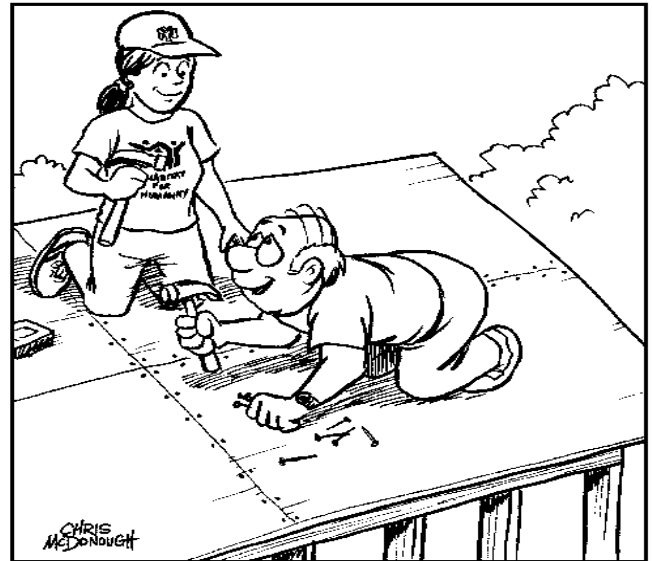

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Just a year ago, we engaged in one of the core activities of our democratic system: a presidential election. Actually, the institution of election can be traced to traditions in the Church, and although bishops are no longer chosen in this way, abbots and abbesses (heads of monastic communities) have almost always been elected by full voting members of their communities. The lifetime appointment begins when the monks or nuns are gathered in "chapter" at the death or resignation of the abbot, and fortunately for all involved, campaigning is not allowed! The members of the community discern, with prayer to the Holy Spirit, who among them is the best suited for leadership. Once chosen, the new leader requests the blessing of the local bishop, who usually presides at a ceremony of consecration or investiture. The ballots are always secret, and a simple majority must be achieved.

In our American system the Electoral College is the determining voice in the presidential election, not the popular election on a November Tuesday, just as the monastic chapter is the electorate. Today, most religious orders elect general superiors in "chapter" by delegates of the professed members, and usually for a term of six years. A few, like the Jesuits, elect for life. At least we don't have that weight on our shoulders when we choose a president. Four years at a time will do!
